The Adolescent Parent Interagency Network (APIN) is proud to announce the 1st Western Conference with a focus on pregnant and parenting adolescents. The conference will feature keynote speakers **Dr. Harvey Karp and Kim Barthel**. Dr. Karp, Assistant Professor, Pediatrics UCLA, is a renowned pediatrician and child development specialist. His discovery of an infant calming reflex is being used across North America to promote good parenting and to help prevent child abuse, SIDs and post-partum depression. Dr. Karp's landmark books and DVDs, “The Happiest Baby on the Block” and “The Happiest Toddler on the Block” are revolutionizing the way our culture understand the needs of young children. Kim Barthel has brought the concepts of sensory processing to diverse populations, including children and adults with autism, attention deficit disorder, and fetal alcohol spectrum disorder, but more profoundly to populations with complex disorders combining psychiatric etiology and attachment based challenges. Recently Kim has expanded her practice to include a blend of sensory processing intervention with counseling for teens and adults experiencing anxiety, depression, phobia and dysregulation.

APIN invites the submission of proposals for poster displays, discussions, and presentations of creative projects, research and evaluation at this innovative national conference. Topics with a focus on the adolescent may include but are not limited to themes such as:

- Pregnancy/Parenting/Health
- Brain Development
- Attachment
- Social and Education Determinants
- Collaborative or Interdisciplinary Services
- Policy

The APIN steering committee will employ a “blind” review process to select projects for presentation. Winning submissions must be presented in person during the May 7 & 8th conference in Winnipeg, MB.

Criteria for selection:

- a. Originality of work,
- b. Relevance to conference themes
- c. Timeliness
- d. Quality, clarity, and completeness of the abstract
- e. Significance for improving the quality of services for pregnant & parenting adolescents

Presentation Formats:

Poster Displays

Applicants can display their research projects that are either completed or in-progress at a special poster session during the conference.

Breakout Sessions

Presentation of current research papers, programs or discussions related to either the keynote speaker's topics or topics of interest to potential participants as listed above in criteria. These sessions will be approximately 60 – 90 minutes in length with time allotted for questions and answers.

Proposal Guidelines:

Members of the APIN planning committee will review and select appropriate proposals.

Proposals for the sessions should be written in English, and include the following:

1. Name and address of author/presenter
2. Email address of author/presenter
3. Affiliation
4. Title of presentation
5. Indication of whether the submission is submitted for a Poster Display or to be offered as a Breakout Session
6. Audio/Visual requirements for the presentation
7. An abstract of 400-500 words (excluding references) which should include:
 - a. theoretical background of the presentation
 - b. purpose (aim) of the presentation
 - c. method of information collection
 - d. a synthesis of the content
 - e. conclusions and implications of the presentation.
